How she took the risk and handled the difficulties of choosing self employment: I was tired of repetition and working in the corporate world. I knew I was born for something more. I became desperate to find my passion. I started off with volunteering for different events and decided to go back to school for Event and Meeting Management in George Brown. Once I completed my program, I was asked to manage an event for a friend of mine. From the very first event, I knew this is where I wanted to be. I knew I found my passion.

While pursuing my passion, I continued working in the financial industry. I stayed in the financial industry for ten years. I was unhappy and desperate to find a way out. I tried to apply for event management jobs for other companies, but because I was just starting out they said I didn't have enough experience. So I got fed up and decided to create my own experiences. I decided to start Elan Cachet. I started with volunteering my services and getting the company name out there. Soon I was being hired to manage all types of events. It was extremely difficult to get this point but the pain was worth it because I created my own destiny. Now I have an amazing business partner and my firm has grown from a one woman show to 14 amazing event managers.

Her main message to women:

If you have a passion for something, pursue it. Never give up and keep pushing. Learn all that you can about your passion, network with different organizations and no matter how rough it may seem, keep going. Look at your end result; look at where you want to be and not where you are now. Write down every dream and goal and never doubt yourself ever. Don't worry about how long it will take, just do it and before you know it you've reached your goal.

Do all these things and I promise you, one day, you will get there!

Community Partner Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peel





Big Brothers Big Sisters of Peel has been making a positive difference in the lives of the children and youth in our community since 1967. Our mentoring programs include One-to-One Friendship, Group Mentoring, In-School Mentoring, Teen Mentoring, Go Girls! Healthy Bodies, Healthy Minds, Game On and Big Bunch. We believe that every child should have the opportunity to reach his or her full potential, both as individuals and citizens. By spending time together and sharing in fun activities our mentors teach by example the importance of giving and giving back, of staying in school, and of having respect for family, peers and community. Each time a child is paired with a mentor or students are introduced to an in-school program, we start something incredible – a life-changing relationship built on friendship, trust and empowerment. Witnessing the transformation of a child into a confident, concerned and motivated young person is a remarkable thing.

Community Partner The Salvation Army - Honeychurch FLRC

The Family Life Resource Centre (FLRC) is an emergency shelter for women and children fleeing family violence. FLRC is operated on the basis that all persons seeking assistance have hidden potential which must be assisted to be cultivated. Each person comes to the Centre with different life experiences and must be given opportunity to begin to face these experiences and commence the 'healing' process.

The Family Life Resource Centre is more than a 'shelter'. There are groups which take place to assist the clients with their life skills as well as daily living skills. There are also groups to assist them to acquire positive parenting skills and develop their self esteem. Each woman is assigned to an individual Counsellor who will work with her for the 6 to 8 weeks the family will stay here. The children are also assisted by the two Children's Counsellor's on site. It is also a place where we will assist the clients with housing, immigration and legal issues.

This shelter is unique in that we offer individual apartment living for the families where they can begin to re-build their lives once again. We work hard to give the families the best start possible and offer many events and activities, day camp, summer camp and outings that help with the healing and create good memories for these families. It has been our dream to have a multipurpose room where we can provide sports events, family movie nights, computer skills training, training and education opportunities and special events such as our Children's Christmas party and Mom's Christmas Luncheon.

Our dream has come true! We officially opened the new multipurpose room on September 15, 2011. This wonderful building is a result of the support we received from our funders, service clubs, community businesses and private donors. BPW is very supportive and we have listed you on our donation tree of honour. You are a part of this new reality, one that will enhance the potential to expand our programs to meet the needs of these women and children in crisis. The additional services we will now be able to provide will give these women and children the tools they need to better equip them to move on with their lives.

Community Partner United Way of Peel

At United Way of Peel Region, we measure our success not by the number of programs we fund or the number of social service collaborations we are involved in. We measure our success by the number of lives we change.

Donna* is one of those lives.

When she was eight months pregnant, Donna was beaten, stabbed and strangled unconscious by her boyfriend. She lay on the floor clinically dead, without oxygen for more than four minutes. Miraculously the kicks of her unborn son revived her as paramedics arrived on the scene.

Donna was referred to a United Way-funded agency that supports abused women and their children. Her abuser was sent to jail for attempted murder.

Domestic abuse is on the rise in Peel Region, with cases increasing by 40 per cent in recent years. This is a major concern because violence within an intimate relationship puts a woman at grave risk. Domestic violence hurts children too. Witnessing family violence tends to result in children experiencing higher rates of depression, aggression, delinquency and other emotional problems.

United Way cares deeply about this issue. We invest in the frontlines of combating family violence. Last year, United Way-funded agencies – such as Family Education Centre, Interim Place and Victim Services of Peel – provided shelter, counselling and support to more than 17,000 women and children in our community. United Way continues to be a key stakeholder in 12 collaboratives whose mandates include advocating for systemic policy changes.

United Way is the largest funder of social services after Government. For every dollar donated, 84 cents is wisely and strategically invested in social service programs and initiatives. We use the most current research in our decision-making to ensure United Way dollars – your dollars – are used to tackle immediate needs as well as underlying causes of our community's most challenging social issues.

"I give thanks every day that support was there for me when I needed it," Donna says. "[My abuser] totally ruined my life. [The shelter] gave me a safe place to stay. They gave me the strength to move on and get myself together."

Today, Donna is a single mom, homeowner, author and successful business owner. She is also a community volunteer who advocates for people in need, and is writing a book to help other abused women.

United, we can continue to help women like Donna escape abuse and start building a better life for themselves and their children. United, we can make change happen.
